Science and Methods - Finding Common Ground in Interdisciplinary Collaborations

Abstract

The Sandbjerg Seminar this year is titled 'Science and Methods - Finding Common Ground in Interdisciplinary Collaborations.' Finding common ground in interdisciplinary collaboration is crucial for success. Researchers from different disciplines often struggle to understand one another due to varying epistemic hierarchies, methods and approaches to inquiry. Different disciplines can enhance the quality of research by achieving mutual understanding and speaking a 'common language'

In this seminar, we will focus on understanding different research practices and the benefits and challenges of working interdisciplinarily, employing mixed methods, leveraging overlapping methodologies, benefiting from each other's strengths, and finding common ground. We will hear from researchers who have hands-on experience with interdisciplinary projects, shedding light on the challenges and opportunities that arise when diverse scientific methods intersect.

Furthermore, we will explore how playful approaches and collective tinkering can create a conducive environment for creativity and collaboration, opening up new adjacent possibilities in research. We will reflect on what we find lacking in our current scientific methods and consider what we would like to learn from other scientific methods aiming to promote more coherent and effective interdisciplinary research.

13:00-13:45 'Opportunities and Challenges in Interdisciplinary Research' By Associate Professor, K. Brad Wray

> In his talk, Brad will examine the special opportunities and challenges presented by interdisciplinary collaborative research. Brad's starting point is Thomas Kuhn's skeptical remarks about working across disciplinary lines. Though Kuhn rightly recognizes the challenges researchers face in engaging in interdisciplinary research, Brad examines how these challenges can be transcended, and the payoff that awaits those who are able to overcome such challenges.

> K. Brad Wray is an Associate Professor in the Center for Science Studies at Aarhus University. He is also a Carlsberg Monograph Fellow at AIAS, and an affiliate of the Center for Immunology of Viral Infections (CiViA), at Aarhus University.

13:45-14:30 'Common ground - not to be found, but hard work. Lessons from science studies' By Associate Professor, Peter Danholt

Science studies is a broad and diverse field that focuses on the empirical study of scientific practices. Prominent scholars in the field are Bruno Latour, Hans Jörg Rheinberger, Donna Haraway and Isabelle Stengers. Briefly put, according to science studies, science is a nature-culture construction.

In his talk Peter will address the challenge that this poses to all disciplines, namely, not to be 'sleepwalkers', that mindlessly reproduce existing practices of one's field; nor try to mimic other disciplines assumed 'hardness'; or fall prey to a sort of pluralism where all disciplines are 'equally good'. Not an easy task - but a necessary one, nonetheless, if science means producing knowledge in a response-able interaction with the world. The presentation will focus on Isabelle Stengers

conception of 'interested science' as a way to address this problem.

Peter Danholt is an Associate Professor at the School of Communication and Culture, Department of Digital Design and Information Studies and SHAPE - Shaping Digital Citizenship, affiliated with the AIAS-SHAPE fellowship programme.

15:00-15:45 **'Experiences with working interdisciplinarily'** By <u>Associate Professor and AIAS Associate fellow, Donna Briggs</u> Bødtkjer

> Donna is a member of one of the AIAS collaborative groups '3-2-1- Go group': 'Anatomical Theater: Early Modern and Contemporary Dissection as Investigative Art', in which aesthetic disciplines, medical history contemporary medical education, and digital humanities are brought together. In her talk, Donna will share some of her experiences with working on interdisciplinary projects; opportunities and challenges when different science and methods meet.

Donna Briggs Bødtkjer is a current AIAS Associate Fellow (2023-2025) and an Associate Professor at the Department of Biomedicine. She is a medical physiologist exploring the structure and function of the lymphatic circulation through an almost exclusively human-based translational approach. In addition to ongoing studies of lymphatic vessels in the lab and clinic, she is translating and modernizing Thomas Bartholin's original lymphatic works.
